Pre-School

The children thoroughly enjoyed World Languages Day. Mrs Beard read the children the very well-known story of *The Very Hungry Caterpillar,* in French! This was followed by 'chocolat chaud' and a baguette whilst enjoying the sounds of some French café music.

As part of our topic *All About Me* the children have loved telling each other about who is in their family and what they like to do together. On a visit to Forest School, they were extremely creative and made pictures of their family members using lots of natural objects.











Reception

This week, the children were introduced to our core text, *Dogger*, by Shirley Hughes. They enjoyed listening to the story whilst cuddling a favourite toy they had brought in from home. We discussed how Dave, the main character, felt when he lost his toy and what they would do if they were sad or cross.

The children's toys have had a fabulous time visiting Reception: enjoying being painted, taken for picnics and even being sung songs around the camp fire!











Year 1

In science, year 1 have been investigating their senses. So far we have explored our sense of smell and taste, understanding that they are both linked. The children tasted a range of crisps flavours and had to predict what they thought they were. We had some interesting answers including truffle, pasta and 'normal'! We have been pleased to see the children's confidence in making predictions, even when they don't match the final result!

The children thoroughly enjoyed their French drama workshop for European day of languages! It was amazing how much they could understand!











Year 2

The children been busy harvesting apples from our school orchard. We took some of the apples to be pressed into juice that we can sell to raise money for charity. The rest of the apples went to the kitchen to be turned into a yummy apple crumble!





Year 2 were very kindly invited by Bede's School to attend a mini tennis festival. The children rotated around a series of activities in small groups, mixing with several other Year 2 groups from neighbouring schools. This was a 'first' and all the children had a fantastic time.







Year 3

The children went to the Booth Museum to kickstart their Science topic off in the best way! They learnt some interesting facts about skeletons and then moved on to the activities. Each group had to identify whether the animal was a carnivore or herbivore by looking at their skulls and paying close attention to their eye placement and teeth.

We also had the opportunity to use magnifying glasses to look closely at tortoise shells, elephant tusks and other artefacts. The best part was having to wear white gloves in order to assembly the human skeleton using real bones!











Year 4

The children visited the Wings Museum in Balcombe as a part of their unit on WWII: The Home Front.

The day started with an aretefact-handling workshop, where they were able to feel and examine a variety of objects from the past. Following this, they explored a Dakota plane (eating lunch in it, too!) as well as experiencing what it would have been like in a bunker. This was a fantastic start to our unit and a great time was had by all!







Year 4 & 5 Overnight Camp

We were immensely proud of the children in Year 4 and 5 who, after 3 months of waiting finally camped under the stars..... on a Friday night at school.

Following the postponement of their summer camp, the children were kind and thoughtful in their care towards one another and energetic in their play as they set up their beds, learned fire lighting skills at Forest School and enjoyed all manner of snacks and treats while they had the school to themselves, with appropriate adult supervision!

Having caught up on some much needed sleep over the long weekend, they have continued to share lovely memories of the event after returning to school the following week.

Year 5

As an introduction to their history unit on the Romans, the children set off to visit the fantastic Roman Palace at Fishbourne this week.

They had the chance to make mosaics, explore a Roman kitchen, have a go at weaving and write their names in Roman numerals. They also sat alongside a real-life Roman, who told them all about life in the Roman army and answered their varied questions! It was a superb day out and allowed all learners to really imagine what a Roman Palace would have looked like almost 2,000 years ago.











Year 5 & 6 Mathematicians

Four eager Year 6 and six Year 5 mathematicians were selected this week to take part in an inter-school competition, hosted by Windlesham House Prep School and St Andrew's Eastbourne respectively.

Our pupils were paired up with almost 50 other pairs at each competition, all eagerly taking part in rounds of frenetic maths challenges. Along the way they flexed their problem-solving muscles, facing countdown number problems, algebraic reasoning and a good deal of lateral thinking.

All the pupils were wonderful ambassadors for LPH and made their teachers incredibly proud. A huge well done to Dino and Myla for placing first in the Year 5 competition held at St Andrews!













European Day of Languages

The whole school celebrated European Day of Languages with gusto! The corridors welcomed children with flags from around the world, each displaying a different way of saying hello.

Pre-school shared a story, hot chocolate and practised their greetings with a visitor from France. We experienced a variety of French theatre workshops and shared stories in French from Reception to Year 8 with a variety of themes from *Goldilocks and the Three Bears* to *The Three Musketeers*.



10 tips for parents and carers HOW TO BE GREEN WITH YOUR TECH

Right now, humans aren't living sustainably: we're taking too many resources and not leaving the world in a fit state for future generations. Old tech products are a clear example: if we throw them away, the poisonous lead and mercury inside can get into the food chain through the soil. Recycling tech, though, has its own issues: it's often exported to countries where the law doesn't protect people from hazards. Whole villages (including children) sort through discarded devices to remove useful parts and substances like gold, silver and copper – often putting their health at risk. Finding ways to re-use tech is the greenest option.



So what can we do with those cupboards and drawers full of old phones and unwanted computers?

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What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Roblox is one of the most popular video games on the market, By 2020, the game's makers were claiming that more than half of children in the USA play it. As a 'sandbox' title, Roblox offers a huge amount of creative freedom; it lets players create their own gaming experiences with the Roblox Status of Boblox of the Robles of Status of Robles of Status of which can then be shared with other players online. Roblox fosters creative thinking and enjoys a robust online community of fans.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

Roblox encourages players to communicate online (including a group chat facility). This could expose children to risks such as scammers, online predators, harassment, griefers and more. The in-game chat has some filters, but isn't perfect; players can still send harmful messages to others – such as scam links or general hostility – while predators can reach out to children directly.

PUBLIC SERVERS

WHAT ARE

THE RISKS?

Roblox has private or VIP servers which allow people to play exclusively with their friends, but this costs money. Most Roblox players will instead be on public servers that anyone can join. Servers can host games which focus on all kinds of aspects, including direct player interaction. Some games and servers, therefore, will put children more at risk of contact from strangers than others.

ONLINE DATERS

These are also called 'ODers' and are quite common in Roblox. An ODer is an individual who joins a game with the intention of finding someone to date online – and eventually meet in person. Such online dating is against the Roblox community guidelines, but this usually doesn't deter ODers. Some player-built Roblox game worlds have even been designed with online dating specifically in mind.

PEGIRATING

IN-APP PURCHASES

Roblox is actually free to download and play, but bear in mind that there are some hidden costs. Players are encouraged to make purchases in the game, for example, using real money. People can also buy extra Robux (the in-game currency) to spend on cosmetic items in the game, while it's possible to purchase a private or VIP server.

To RE Advice for Parents & Carers

SET PARENTAL CONTROLS

Roblox comes with several parental control options, which are explained well on the game's official website. It's essential to enter the correct date of birth for your child, as that allows Roblox to automatically apply the appropriate chat filters. The game also allows parents and carers to set monthly spending restrictions and monitor their child's account.

DISABLE PRIVATE MESSAGING

Roblox's private messaging function raises the risk of children being contacted by people they may not want to speak with – potentially leading to bullying, harassment, toxicity and scam attempts. The game allows you to disable messages from anyone who hasn't been added as a friend on your child's account.

PRIVATE SERVERS

If your child has some genuine friends to play Roblox online with, paying for a private or VIP server decreases the risk of contact from strangers. Even then, however, some players could invite other people – who might not necessarily be child friendly – into the private server. If your child is a Roblox fan, it's important to talk with them regularly about who they are playing the game with.

MONITOR SPENDING

If they don't understand they're using real money, it's easy for children to accidentally spend a sizeable amount in the game. Using parental controls to place limits on their spending will help avoid any nasty financial surprises. Ensuring that you have two-factor authentication on your payment accounts also makes it harder for your child to spend money inadvertently.

DEALING WITH STRANGERS

At some point in their development, your child will need to learn how to deal with strangers online. Show them how to block and report any users who are upsetting them or asking uncomfortable questions. Talking to them about what's OK to discuent of any what they should never tell a stranger online – will help them understand how to communicate with other people online safely.
